
MERRY CHRISTMAS

The Winter Exhibition got off to a great start with the private view on the Friday night. It was well attended and supported by two mayors.

We had the perfect entertainment in the form of a portrait demonstration by our member Mark Fielding. Mark's sitter was Roger Alford, a local councillor, and in his working life a mason (see image to right).

Some good sales were achieved, and many positive remarks on the quality of the work and the curation. There were some outstanding demonstrations during the week of portraiture in different forms, from Mark Fielding, Annette Wrathmell, lan Pethers and Ali Fife Cook.

Disappointingly these did not have the same high attendance. Whether it was the monsoonal weather or general lethargy because of the financial climate - we are unsure. One suggestion made by the AONB team was to have more late night openings. Our evaluation and the feedback received will be taken into consideration when planning next year's winter exhibition.









FEATURED ARTIST - Anne Payne

Hello and Season's Greetings. As I take on the role of Chair of Drawn to the Valley, this seems an appropriate time to introduce myself to you.

I'm Scottish, from Edinburgh, a lovely city of many cultures, though I also have West Highland crofting roots too. As such, I've been holding a needle and crafting all my life. I favour natural materials such as linen, wool, cotton, silk and leather, and have a penchant for making bags, as shown. Why bags? Well, we don't need to 'try them on' so one size fits all.

My current favourite craft is jewellery making. Silver soldering is a relatively recent skill, developed under the guidance of the fabulous Xuella Arnold who is based at Buckland Abbey.



I first arrived in the Southwest in 2006 to take up the post of Professional Lead in Nutritional Science and Dietetics at the University of Plymouth, a move initiated by my late husband who came from the Southwest. I was an academic for over 25 years, previously working in the University of Edinburgh and in Glasgow. However, my real passion has always been for arts and crafts and so I left academia behind in 2019 and have been happily making stuff, doing fairs and setting up my website since. I feel liberated.

Joining Drawn to the Valley has given me a whole new family of creative people who share my love of colour, texture and gemstones. We talk about the impact of our work on the environment and I can eat cake without feeling guilty.

As Drawn to the Valley approaches its 20th year, in 2024, I feel excited to be part of the Committee shaping its future. The group is growing fast with many new members. I would like to see us draw on the experience of existing members to provide guidance for new members taking forward ideas and ventures. Can we identify novel venues for our exhibitions, across the Tamar Valley? I would welcome any suggestions and thoughts from you?





FEATURED ARTIST - Anne Payne

Q: What's the best work-related thing you have done recently?

A: That's got to be 'Drawn to Make'. It was so inspiring to be surrounded by the fabulous work of other crafters.

Q: Where's your favourite place?

A: To be honest, it's my cottage in Tavistock. Closely followed by Skye, Dartmoor, Edinburgh and Venice.

Q: What's your favourite book or film?

A: I loved Girl with a Pearl Earring, both the film and book by Tracey Chevalier. It has it all: art, intense drama, history, a beautiful setting and fabulous actors.

Q: What irritates you?

A: Talking in cinemas. I've been known to put on my best School Mam act and tell folk to shut it.

Q: Who would you most like to meet (dead or alive)?

A: Leonardo Da Vinci (or maybe Aiden Turner who played him in a recent series). He was such an incredible man, though I don't speak Italian.

Q: Who is your hero/who do you most admire?

A: That's difficult, lots of people come to mind. One lady who changed the lives of many women in the 20th Century was Coco Chanel. Her vison liberated women from restrictive, claustrophobic costumes, enabling us to engage more freely in life.

Q: What motivates and inspires you?

A: It sounds rather like a cliché but my crafts are inspired by the natural world, such as the plants and birds in my garden, the solid granite Tors of Dartmoor, tumbling streams and shiny natural gemstones. Music, especially live folk, jazz and blues are also a big part of my life.



All about the eyes - Ali Fife Cook

The winter exhibition 'Face Value, A Portrait of the Tamar Valley' was my first time exhibiting with DttV, and I really enjoyed the whole experience. Everyone was very helpful and friendly, I loved chatting with the visitors, I was delighted to make good sales and there was a rather unexpected highlight on the final day. When I was stewarding on the Thursday Kathy asked me if I'd like to do a demo on the Saturday. I'd never done a demo before, but – bolstered and encouraged by all the lovely comments people had made – I said yes.



As not very many people know much about working with pastels I thought I'd like to give the option of it being hands-on, and as the subject was portraits and I'm a wildlife artist, it seemed that animal eyes would be a great subject.

I put together a selection of six animal eye images that people could work on if they wanted to. Some people didn't have time to do more than watch, ask questions, and do some small trials of pastels, but there were some who stayed longer and for two DttV members, Rosemary Wood and Mary Toon, it turned into a full workshop, both of them completing a picture whilst they were there. I was pleased to be able to pass on so much of the information I've learnt, and to teach techniques for PanPastels, pastel sticks and pastel pencils; not forgetting my rather unusual pencil sharpening technique using a callus remover, which caused some amusement! I think it's lovely that DttV often include demos and workshops during an exhibition, which adds a lot to the experience for visitors and creates a great atmosphere.

If you have not yet completed the process for setting up your website profile, or have tried and found it confusing, then there is good news... in the New Year, Ren is planning to arrange visits to all the membership areas to help people set up their online galleries and profiles.

She will bring her laptop with her and help members set up their gallery and profile in person. All you need to have are digital copies of the images you want to use as a profile picture and images of any items you wish to sell through the gallery section of your profile. You can bring these on your phone, ipad or on a memory stick.

There are some common misunderstandings of how the process works, which it may be helpful to clear up at this stage, so here is some clarification:

- You will need a login to access the forms for setting up your profile, or updating your gallery, which are to be found in your users menu.
- If you do not know your login, get in touch with Ren and she can send you a link to create a new password.
- The process is not automatic and you cannot set up your profile or upload information or items to your gallery directly; all the methods of delivering the information for your profile and gallery are sent to Ren, who uses the information you provide to create your profile for you.

If you find evrything just too technically difficult, Ren can do it for you via email instead, so please get in touch via contact@drawntothevalley.org if this all sounds too daunting.

If you already have a profile, please remember that you need to let Ren know of any updates or sold items ASAP. You can have as many items in your gallery as you want, there is no longer a limit of three items only. Finally, don't forget to share the link to your gallery on your social media and whenever you are promoting yourself.

If you are interested in attending one of these Website Workshops, please can you let Ren or your Area Rep know so that we can assess numbers and find suitable venues in your area.

Plymouth Culture Vacant Spaces Toolkit

The high street has been heavily impacted by the pandemic and changing consumer habits, leading to an increase in vacant units in our cities., there is now a toolkit available for how to take advantage of vacant spaces.

Vacancy Atlas, in collaboration with Plymouth Culture, Plymouth City Council, Historic England and the C-Care Initiative, have created the toolkit for those looking to utilise empty spaces.

The toolkit is designed to help individuals and organisations to do the following:

- Find and gain access to vacant spaces,
- Develop a robust plan of action for the project and space,
- Project budgeting,
- Understand the legal obligations and manage the risks involved,
- Marketing.

ART COMPETITION DESIGN A STONE TO MARK THE SOURCE OF THE RIVER TAMAR £500 PRIZE TO THE WINNER

Background

The river Tamar is an important part of the culture of Devon and Cornwall. For most of its length it forms the boundary between the two counties. We aim to install a marker stone beside the road crossing Woolley Moor next to the boggy field in which the Tamar arises, and are holding a competition open to all, to design what should be on the stone. To reflect the geology of the two counties, the proposed stone will be a large natural granite boulder with one flat face. Set into this face will be a slab of slate, to provide contrast to the grey of the granite and allow for much more detailed designs to be carved into it.

The Competition

We are looking for a design that reflects the essence of the Tamar and includes the text 'Pennfenten prp Dowr Tamar - Source of the River Tamar'. The design needs to be carved into stone and so needs to be relatively simple, and a single colour. It also needs to fit onto a circular, square or irregularly shaped piece of slate 1 metre across or in diameter – though if space permits, elements of the design could be carved onto the surrounding granite.

Initial judging will be undertaken by the Tamara Landscape Partnership's steering group who will come up with a shortlist of entries which will be presented to the parish councils along the Tamar and the public to determine the final choice. The prize for the winning design is £500.

Rules:

By submitting entries to the Source of Tamar stone competition, each entrant confirms and warrants that:

- If your entry wins you agree to provide a digital image of the artwork for use to make the marker stone, and if needed for it to be altered to meet the technical requirements to enable it to be carved on the stone. This is something we would do in consultation with you and the stone carver and if you are not happy with the proposedchanges, you can withdraw your entry from the competition;
- You are the sole author of each entry and that it is your originalwork;
- You have created and so own the copyrightand any other intellectual propertyrights of the image and any component parts;
- By entering the competition, you grant TamaraLandscape Partnership a non-exclusive, irrevocable licence to reproduce, enlarge, publish or exhibit, on any media, the images for any purpose directly connected to the Tamara Coast to Coast Way;
- Any personal contact information that you share with the Tamara Landscape Partnership via the competition will be held securely and in accordance with the Data Protection Act. We will never share or sell your personal data with third parties.
- The winning artist will be credited in promotional material relating to the stone and will be invited to take part in the formal unveiling of the stone.
- All entries must be received by 23:59 on the 15th February 2023
- Judges decisions are final.
