Notes from the AGM

The AGM took place on 8 December. We'd decided to hold the meeting in Yelverton to make it easier for members coming from Plymouth, as recent AGMs had been in the Tamar Valley Centre at Gunnislake which is convenient for some but not for others. We also held a sale of art materials in the hope of enticing members. Unfortunately, neither of these resulted in an increase in numbers attending and it's fair to say it was a very disappointing turnout. Of course AGMs can be seen as dull, but they are a necessary part of the functioning of any organisation.

One of the requirements of an AGM is to scrutinise and approve the accounts. The AGM was only a short time after the end of the financial year, which could have been fine but a problem came to light to do with the change-over of bank signatories, and a resultant period of time when details from the bank were not automatically feeding into the accounts program. This couldn't be sorted out in time to have the accounts ready for approval at the meeting, so the meeting was suspended and will be resumed in January, just for that one agenda item.

Constitution:

The committee put forward a proposal for small changes to the Constitution. The main one was to allow members to serve longer on the committee should they want to, to enable greater continuity and handing on of knowledge and experience. The changes were approved by the meeting. The Constitution can be found in the members' section on the website.

Committee:

Two committee members stood down at the AGM, Jess Maslen and Debra Parkinson, and we'd like to thank them for all they've done for DttV during their period on the committee. Three members had been co-opted onto the committee during the year and their full committee membership was ratified at the AGM. No new nominations had been received. If anyone is interested in joining the committee, please put your name forward; co-options can take place at any time of the year.

Treasurer:

Anne Payne agreed to stay on as Treasurer for the short term, as no nominations for the post had been received. However, for personal reasons she needs to relinquish the post at the end of February at the latest.

Other matters discussed:

It was noted that the annual subscription will not be increased for 2025. There was a proposal from the committee that the renewal date be altered from the date of joining to 1st January each year, and this was approved. The open discussion at the end of the meeting was mostly around pop-up exhibitions and showing art in shops prior to an exhibition. Iain Grant told the meeting that there was a proposal to renew a previous arrangement for art by members displayed around Derriford Hospital. He will follow this up in the new year.

Gill Sargeant has recently joined Drawn to the Valley. Here she explains what inspires her and the process she uses to creative her art.

I am a self taught artist who turned to art, following early retirement from nursing, in 2009. It really was (and probably still is) a form of therapy. I started working with watercolour, but it was whilst attending a craft fair, I came across a stand that sold silk. This is where my passion for textile art started.

I have spent the last 14 years exploring this medium. Through hand dyeing the various silk textiles, threads and fibres, and using hand embroidery and beading, I create beautiful textural pieces, all inspired by my surroundings of Dartmoor and the South West coastline.

My process always starts with an image/photo that I have taken, developing a colour palette for each new project. My use of colour blending with the dyes is akin to the way a painter creates their palette. Each piece of work is unique. A large piece can take up to 4-6 weeks to complete...sometimes longer.







I continue to develop my craft. I'm always searching for new or different ways to express traditional techniques in a contemporary form. This is why I love what I do, the art never stands still. There is always something new to discover.

I am working, at present, on creating a body of work with the intention of doing my first solo exhibition. Hopefully, exciting times lie ahead.

I'd just like to end with saying thank you to the people I have met since joining DttV. I have been made to feel very welcome.

Dartmoor and Dark Skies: Drawn to the Valley member, Helen Kuumbi, writes about her experience working at a residency with a group of artists

In October I was offered a supported placement on an art residency with Mayes creative. I stayed and worked at Bellever Youth Hostel, Dartmoor, with a group of artists from a mix of disciplines. The residency was focused around prehistoric monuments on Dartmoor and their relationship with the sky. There were a number of visits to sites with archaeoastronomy expert, Carolyn Kennet, as well as time for self-directed research and facilitated group discussions.

I started the residency with a strong set of objectives; I wanted to dive deeper into the theory and concepts that related to a body of work I had already started. This work explored ancient archaeology in our 'natural' spaces.

It was apparent by day two, that the fog was set to stay all week and the planned observations of the night sky from the monuments would not happen. We were piskie led on our first night walk despite staying on hard tracks. The fogs and mist became a significant part of the residency; a forced but different experience of the environment.

From a visual perspective, the mist simplified the forms and heightened an awareness of the unique quality of shapes that the stones and the tors took: silhouetted they became guides, markers and took figure and animal like forms. The transition from first light into morning was a slow unveiling of the surrounding lanscape, and the red and orange hues appeared startlingly vivid in contrast to the diffuse blue light. A small group of us did drawing sessions each night in which the soundscape became the focus of our attention and expression.

I took away some fascinating new ideas and perspectives about the sites we visited, which no doubt in future will feed into my painting practice - however, I feel this residency was more valuable in making me refocus on the foundations of colour and form. Here's some simple takeaways:

- I have revised my methodology and simplified how I approach a new site I intend to paint, that is start without a preconceived idea: just walk in and ask what do I see?
- It has reinforced the importance of giving myself unrestrained time to draw when in the field; allowing a fuller visual processing of the scene and my thoughts in the space.
- I have been able to think about the subtler themes within my paintings that tie the work together beyond the broader subjects.

Since returning to the studio I have begun a new series of paintings from the sketches that I made when visiting Merrivale stone rows. Follow me on Instagram to see how these progress, or drop me a message.

In September and October of this year I was given the opportunity of an Artist in Residence post in Nova Scotia, Canada.

Due to travel I had to carefully consider what materials to use, what opportunities were there and what the studio space would be like. No worries! The studio space was good (and right next door to a cafe) and my decision to take a process-driven approach and to use water-based materials on paper was a good one.

The landscape was interesting and varied and I was able to draw and manipulate materials freely. Visitors were encouraged and varied from smiling children eager to question, prod and poke, to adults including a Professor of Architecture keen to discuss the representation of three dimensional forms on a two dimensional surface and a common interest in the work of Norman Ackroyd.


Attitudes to original art work seemed very different there, and I met avid local collectors who invited me to their homes where wonderful collections were in place.

It was an encouraging, responsive period of hard work, endeavour and soul searching. I was happy to produce an interesting range of visual outcomes, which were beautifully displayed in the gallery next door.


